### PRESIDENT'S REPORT BEDS, BUCKS & HERTS SOCIETY OF CHARTERED ACCOUNTANTS

Beds, Bucks & Herts Society of Chartered Accountants (BBH) exists to support members of the Institute of Chartered Accountants in England and Wales (ICAEW) who live and work in the BBH area.

For everyone 2022 was a year of transition out of lockdown and dealing with its hangover. It has taken until 2023 for a new pattern to life to start with a new but more regular rhythm. For many the changes caused by lockdown and coming out of lockdown have meant some benefited but some also suffered but change generally increases the levels of personal anxiety and stress. Our community is no different.

BBH s main source of income has always been its CPD program but its financial success has been impacted by the changing patterns to working life. Our CPD program created the strong financial position BBH has so we are now using some of our reserves to support it as it looks to find a financially sustainable way forward to retain its position in our community and support members whilst a new rhythm to working life establishes itself. This new CPD program will take time to work out and no doubt we will be faced with some difficult decisions on how our CPD program will look in 2024 and beyond. An added factor for BBH to consider in organising our new CPD program is the District Society review and potential restructure being undertaken by the ICAEW. I am confident that we will find a way forward.

I am proud that BBH has started and supported my Social Mobility initiative, where BBH has employed a local community charity that specialises in reaching children from lower economic backgrounds to find talented people to train as Chartered Accountants. The initiative has the potential to make a positive impact for our community. If this program is successful, it will help our profession to improve its diversity, maintain our relevance to our community and help improve the prospects of individuals and their immediate families. To help develop this initiative BBH is able to engage with members across the whole of BBH, ICAEW and other professionals. This initiative will take time to establish itself but considering the shortfall of ICAEW members available for vacancies there is a clear need to look for the right talent in more areas than has historically happened.

In addition to the above BBH continues to run a wide variety of events for our members to maintain and build our community.

Face to face social events started again in 2022, we ran a young members BBQ in the summer at St Michael's Manor for the first time, which was a success and allowed for BBH to engage with younger members in a more relaxed atmosphere and for them to start to build their personal networks. We will be repeating this event in 2023. The success of this event shows the strength and enterprise of those active members involved in BBH. Our community is fortunate to have a strong group of people willing to help maintain and develop our community. I thank them for their continued efforts and support and look forward to seeing what further progress we can make in 2023 and beyond.

# TREASURER'S REPORT BEDS, BUCKS & HERTS SOCIETY OF CHARTERED ACCOUNTANTS

The financial results of BBH for 2022 were affected by two factors:

- 1. A return to a more normal level of activities after the pandemic, with operating costs doubling from the previous year to £15k; and
- 2. A deterioration in Conferences results with a net loss of nearly £9k in the year compared with a net income of nearly £9k in 2021. This resulted from: a decrease in revenue due to lower attendance, which is linked to practices being very busy in 2022 and therefore a lack of staff availability to attend courses; and an increase in costs following the return to mostly in-person conferences.

As a result the Society recorded a deficit for 2022 of £23k compared with a surplus of £2k for the previous year.

Reserves now amount to some £150k.

#### NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2022

#### 1 Accounting Policies

#### 1.1 Basis of accounting

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the provisions of Section 1A "Small Entities" of Financial Reporting Standard 102 "The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland".

#### 1.2 Accounting convention

The financial statements are prepared under the historical cost convention.

#### 1.3 Self financing activities

Fees and direct expenditure on activities are reflected in the year in which the relevant events occur. The society funds itself by its fee generating activities and any shortfall or overspend is funded from the society's reserves.

#### 1.4 Going concern

These financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis. The committee has a reasonable expectation that the society has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. The society has sufficient financial resources to cover its planned ongoing activities. As a consequence, the committee believes that the society is well placed to manage its business risks successfully despite the current uncertain economic outlook.

#### 1.5 Pension costs

The society operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions payable to the pension scheme are charged to surplus or deficit in the period to which they relate.

#### 2 Services, conferences and other events

The society carries out certain activities for the benefit of members of the society, which are financed by participating members or from other sources of income. The results of these activities, after charging direct expenses, but before any contribution to the society's overheads for running the activities, are as follows:
